# **Compliance Review & Audit Defense**

### AUDIT DEFENSE

## Data Technology Meets Compliance

Davis Davis & Harmon LLC ("DDH") constructed a sound audit strategy, generating tens of millions in sales tax savings for the client and expediting the audit process.

DDH was engaged by a Fortune 500 retailer and power-generation company to perform a sales tax compliance review to identify potential audit exposure, design the detailed transaction data file, improve their compliance process, and implement audit sampling best practices.

## Challenge

- There were no detailed transaction data files to support sales tax return filings during a state sales tax audit.
- There was a communication gap between the tax department and IT.
- Client generates over 97 million records per quarter.
- Because client remits over \$21 million in sales tax per quarter, even infrequent errors can cause a material tax liability when errors are projected through sampling.

### **Solution**

DDH became the liaison between the tax and IT departments to clearly communicate the needs of the tax department.

DDH selected the appropriate data fields and designed a file layout format from the available fields to create a usable transaction detail file for state sales tax audits.

DDH developed a sampling protocol from the transaction population to minimize the impact of infrequent and/or data errors.

DDH identified incomplete or invalid exemption certificates and managed the collection of new certificates to replace the invalid certificates.

### **Results**

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DDH's data file design significantly reduced the client's costs and time associated with pull supporting documentation, improved audit turnaround times, and decreased accumulated interest during audits.

DDH implemented a process to update certificates before starting the audit so that certificates can be accepted under "Good Faith" requirements, reducing tax assessments by millions of dollars.
